

North Carolina Helene Recovery

Nov. 12, 2024

Key Messages

- FEMA has approved **\$228 million to more than 130,000 households and individuals** beginning their recovery. FEMA has approved **\$203 million in Public Assistance funding in North Carolina** to support community recovery.
- FEMA is providing **multiple temporary housing options** to meet North Carolinians' individual needs. More than **4,500 households** are checked in to Transitional Sheltering Assistance hotels and motels. The first step to receiving housing assistance is applying with FEMA.
- The deadline to apply for **FEMA Individual Assistance has been extended to Jan. 7, 2025**, for North Carolinians in 39 counties.

FAQ of the Day: Can I use money from FEMA to repair my private road or bridge?

- Yes, you can use FEMA's Individual Assistance funds to help with permanent repairs to private roads or bridges. You may be eligible for these funds even if your home wasn't damaged.

FEMA is Hiring – Apply Online

- FEMA is hiring in Asheville, Durham, Hickory and Raleigh to support community recovery. Applications are being accepted online. To see open positions and apply, visit usajobs.gov, type keywords "FEMA, Local Hire" and enter the location as "North Carolina."

Direct Temporary Housing Assistance

- FEMA offers several types of housing assistance and temporary shelter solutions for eligible households. Direct Temporary Housing Assistance is approved for 25 counties as an interim solution to permanent housing needs.

Spending of FEMA Grant Money

- If you are a disaster survivor in North Carolina who received a federal disaster assistance grant from FEMA, it is important to use the money only for disaster-related expenses. FEMA sends a letter to grant recipients explaining how to use the funds. Disaster grants are not for regular living expenses.

Online is Fastest Way to Apply for FEMA Assistance

- Homeowners and renters affected by a disaster can apply for federal assistance in several ways: Online at [DisasterAssistance.gov](https://www.fema.gov/disaster-assistance). Via the FEMA App ([fema.gov/about/news-multimedia/mobile-products](https://www.fema.gov/about/news-multimedia/mobile-products)), Calling 800-621-3362. If you use a relay service, such as Video Relay Service (VRS), captioned telephone or other service, give FEMA your number for that service.

Appeal a Decision

- You can appeal any FEMA decision or award amount by sending additional documents, like estimates for repairs, receipts, bills, etc., that show you qualify and need more help. Each decision letter from FEMA explains why you are ineligible and the types of documents to help you appeal. N.C. Disaster Recovery Centers

- A Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) is a one-stop shop to meet with FEMA representatives, apply for FEMA assistance, receive referrals to local assistance, apply with the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) for low-interest disaster loans and more. No appointment is needed.
- DRCs are open 8 a.m.-7 p.m. daily. Find one near you at: [FEMA.gov/drc](https://www.fema.gov/drc) or text “DRC” and a ZIP code to 43362. You can visit any open center, including locations in other states.

Meet with a FEMA mitigation specialist in a DRC

- FEMA mitigation specialists are in DRCs to help answer questions about potential property buyouts and give advice on techniques to repair and rebuild safer and stronger. They are meeting with people at DRCs in:

 - Haywood County
 - Henderson County
 - McDowell County (No. 2)
 - Mecklenburg County
 - Mitchell County
 - Watauga County
 - Yancey County
